GOVERNANCE / OVERSIGHT

- Dependent district formed under Fire Protection District Law of 1987
- County Board of Supervisors serves as the ACFD Board of Directors
- 12-member Fire Advisory Commission comprised of 6 Boardappointed members and 6 City Council members
- Oversight by County Administrator's Office, Auditor-Controller
- Adheres to established County policies and procedures for fiscal, human resources, and programmatic functions



GOVERNANCE / OVERSIGHT

- Five contract cities and two national labs make up Executive Management Oversight Committee (EMOC)
- Service levels are determined by Board of Directors and individual contract agencies
- ACFD provides performance-based fire and emergency services to contract agencies
- ACFD participates in each contract agencies' budgeting process

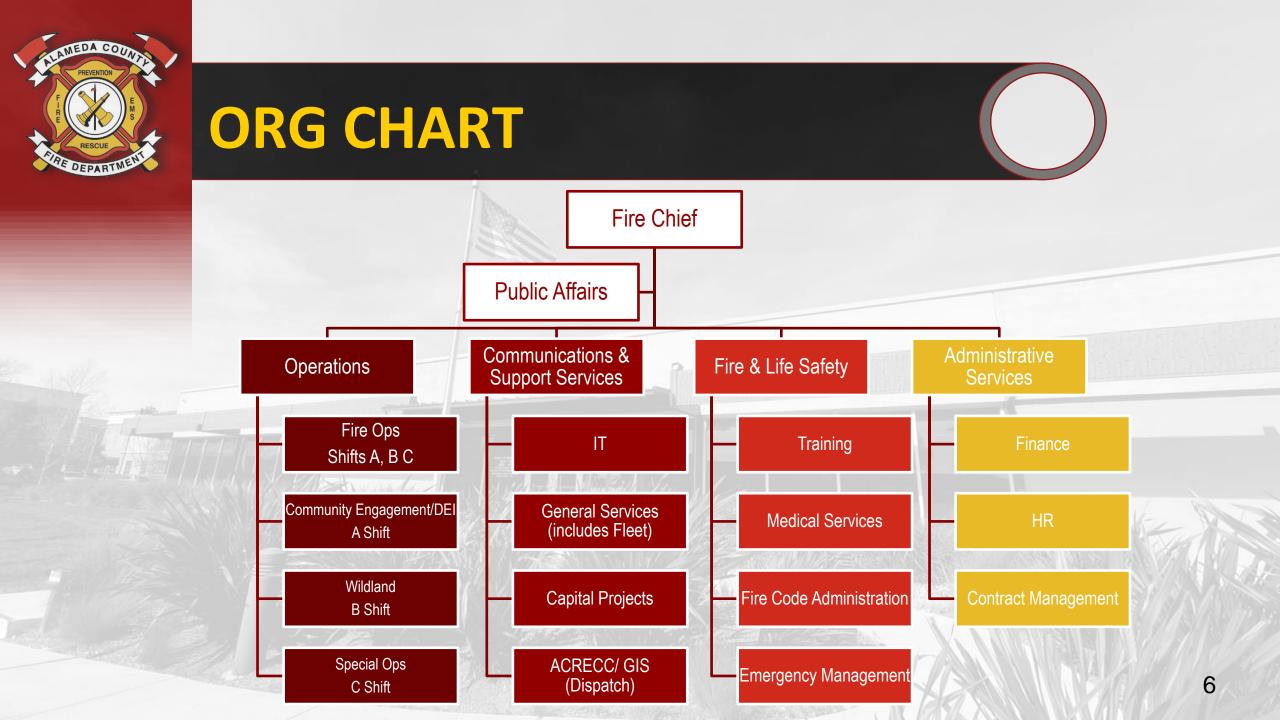








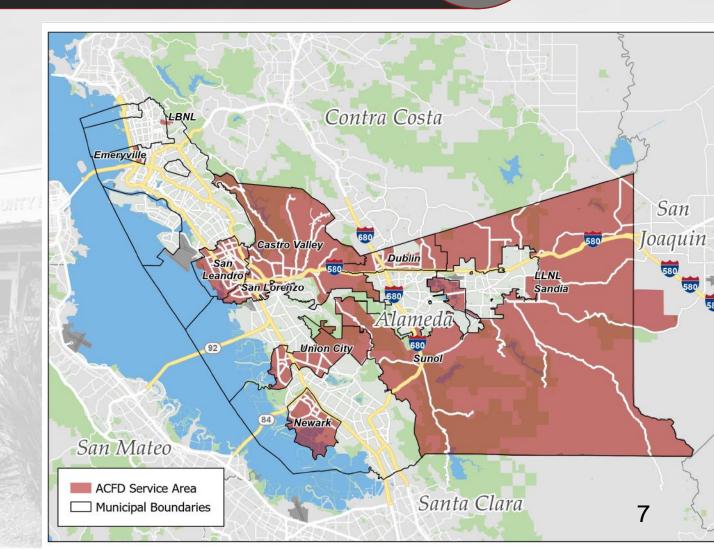

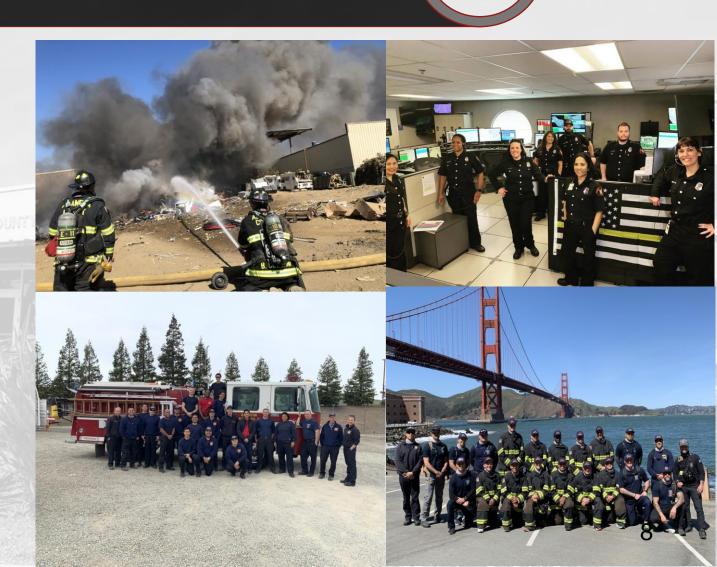
STAFFING AND OPERATIONS

- ACFD receives no general fund, Prop 172, utility user, or business license tax funds





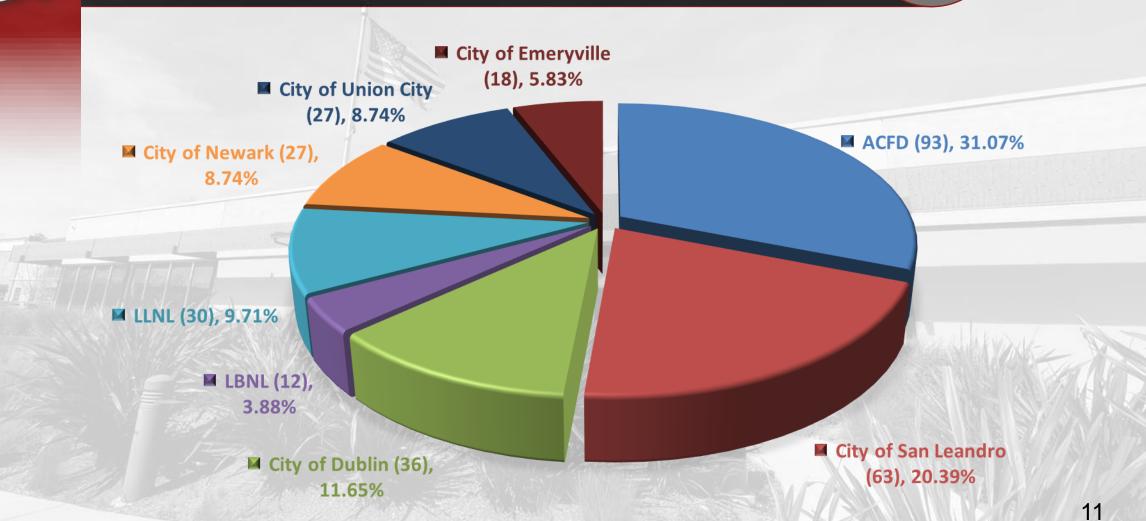








ALLOCATION METHODOLOGY





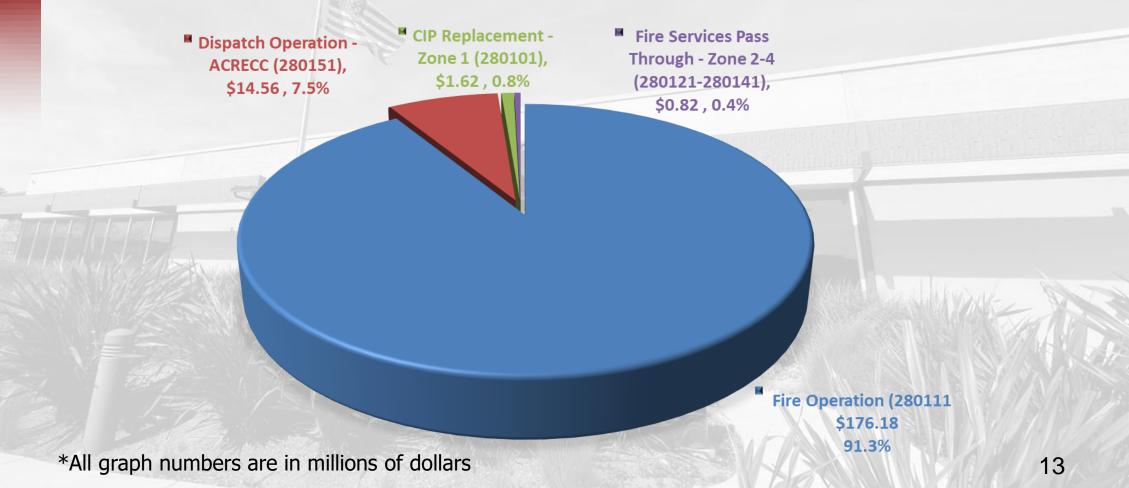

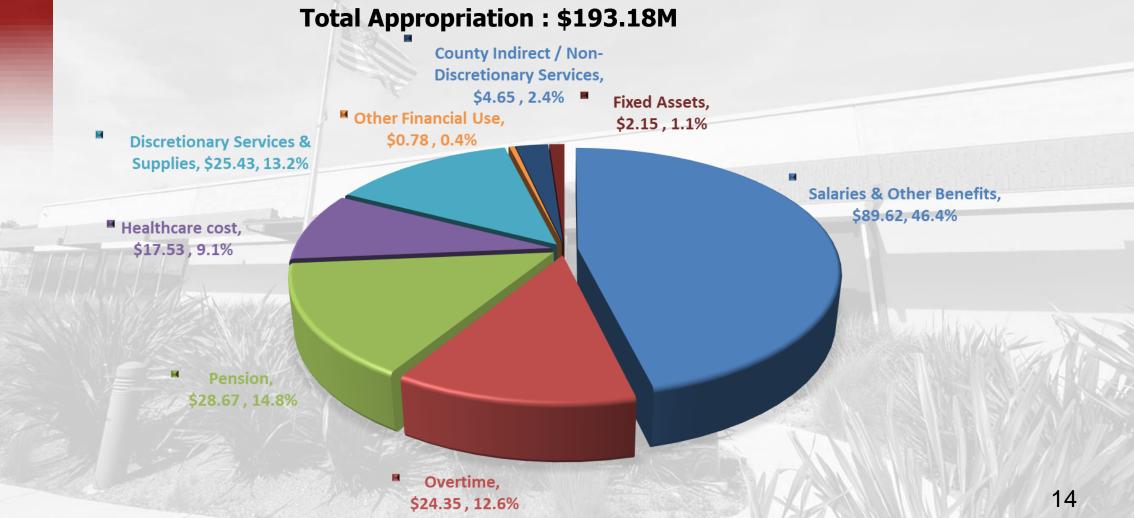
APPROPRIATION BY ORG

Total Appropriation : \$193.18M



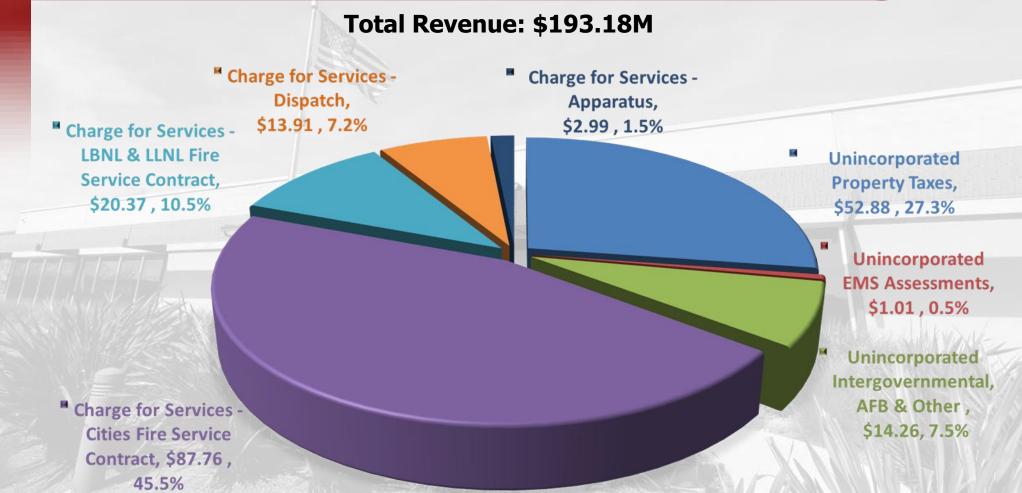


APPROPRIATION BY MAJOR OBJECT

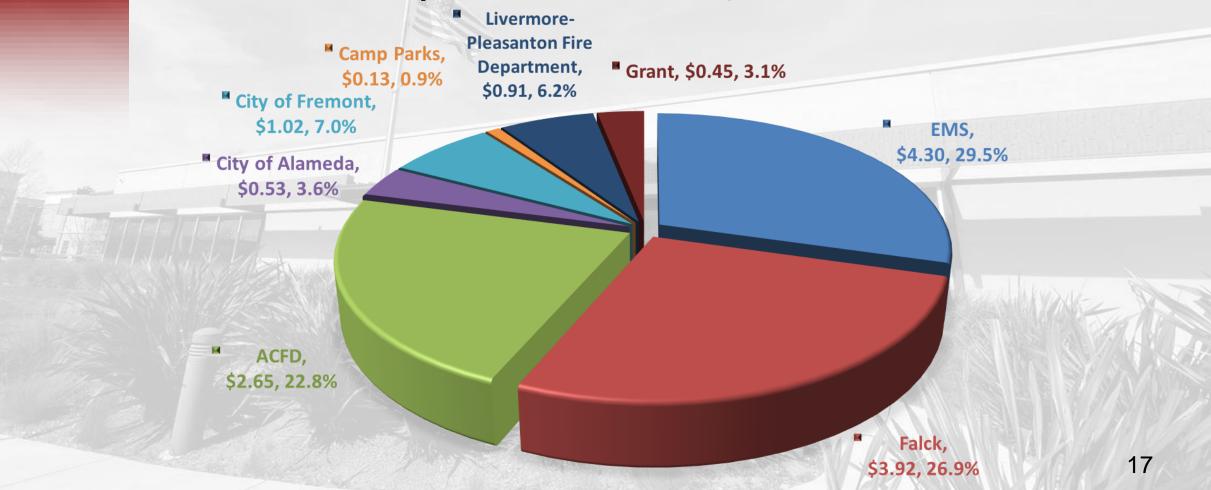

- ✤ Responded to 47,653 incidents in FY 2022-23
- ✤ ACFD conducted 8,920 fire inspections for FY 2022-23
- Facilitated design and secured funding commitment for the Training Facility
- Fire Safety Bond projects
- Implementation of ACFD's Strategic Business Plan
- Continued the work of the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion committee
- Implementation of the Fuels Mitigation Program



FY 2023-24 YEAR IN REVIEW

- Completed the study on dispatch center hiring and training practices to ensure well-trained, respectful and professional workforce with a high degree of cultural competency
- Received a grant award from Department of Homeland Security Port Security Grant Program to purchase a new rescue boat for shallow water operations
- Continued prefunding ACFD's retiree medical obligation to reduce the outstanding liability
- Received grant award from City and County of San Francisco for 2023 Urban Area Security Initiative Grant Fund for the purchase of new upgraded 911 dispatch system
